## Create a timeless kitchen by selecting flooring, cabinetry simultaneously

Base, chair-rail and crown moldings add character and can go a long way toward transforming a kitchen from ordinary to extraordinary. The beauty and definition these accents add are well worth the investment.

White or light-finished natural-wood moldings can create a homey, casual look; darker woods lend a more formal feel.

If you choose base molding that complements the color and texture of the floor, it will act much the way that a frame does around a painting. The same is true for how crown molding can work with the ceiling.

Cabinetry is perhaps the most prominently visible of your permanent design elements. A wide variety of style and color choices are available. As with moldings, darker woods lend a more formal look to the kitchen.

Glazed and painted cabinets also are enjoying a renaissance. They can create a nostalgic feel that many homeowners love, and they generally are more casual than natural wood.

Countertops are another element in permanent design. Granite is the most popular material today because it is beautiful and easy to maintain.

Other natural stones, such as slate, and solid-surface materials, such as Corian or concrete, have their pros and cons. A kitchen-design center will have a knowledgeable professional available to explain them to you.

As you decide which countertop is right for you, take time to think about your lifestyle. Then consider how the material and color will integrate with other permanent design elements in your décor.

When you make good choices about the permanent design elements in your kitchen, it will be easier to change the look with inexpensive alterations such as paint, wallpaper, hardware and appliances. When the permanent design elements are timeless, so is your kitchen décor.
